Dear Friends,



We are still abuzz about Easter at the ballpark! We celebrated the Great Day of Resurrection with all the excitement of "Opening Day!" The crowd cheered our team onward with a Pentecost wind blowing in from the outfield. Bagpipes lead the procession of our choir, children with banners, the beadle and worship leaders from the centerfield gate to home plate. We sang the great hymns of Easter with brass accompaniment, the Rejoice band and our choir. We filled the airwaves with great music, the jumbo-tron displayed the action and I got to use all my baseball metaphors for the "Sermon on the Mound!"

We received great coverage from the News & Record and local TV news. The newspaper story reported that we had 1,860 in attendance but that was only the number of people who went through the turnstiles. That did not include all of those who came in before the turnstiles were operating, those who went around the turnstiles, those who came in from the side gate on Edgeworth, or those who came

early to set up. More than 2,000 filled out the attendance cards, and of course, many did not fill them out and turn them in. Based on all our information, plus the Grasshoppers' projection for number of people per section, we think we had 2,300 to 2,500 in attendance. Dolly Jacobs reports that 170 visitors filled out cards and we, of course, have let them know how grateful we are for their attendance. We gave out or sold the 500 baseball caps we had on hand which had the insignia of a baseball within the rose window.

As I said that day, I work with the best colleagues in the kingdom. Their planning and execution, along with countless congregational members, and the support of Grasshoppers' General Manager, Donald Moore, made the Easter service possible. And once again, we showed that during our renovation, our congregation is embracing the transition with a terrific spirit.

What's next? We continue to "be the church." The Easter season runs through May, we are celebrating "Holy Hilarity Sundays," training a great group of newly elected elders, have chosen our first Cynthia Price Resident (see page 5), have planted our first Giving Back Garden, announced a new director for our important Step-Up ministry, are preparing for Vacation Bible School and summer youth trips, discussing the core priorities of our church through the Session's Antioch committee, and making progress with the renovation through the excellent leadership of our Project Review Committee. We celebrate Pentecost on June 8 and our summer schedule begins Memorial Day weekend (May 25).

I have been elected one of eight commissioners from Salem Presbytery to our bi-annual PC(USA) General Assembly which meets in mid-June in Detroit. Commissioners from 172 Presbyteries from around the country will meet for a week to deal with important issues facing our church. There is a lot of work involved. I have been assigned to work on the Civil Union and Marriage Issues committee. The GA convenes, then several days of committee work begins, then the GA reconvenes to hear reports and recommendations from the various committees, which includes majority and minority reports. Then the commissioners vote on the recommendations. Thank goodness, the Tigers are in town and I'll get a night off to take in America's pastime.

First pastoral resident coming from Duke



Libby Boehne, a soon-to-be graduate of Duke Divinity School, will begin a two-year term as FPC's first Cynthia Price Pastoral Resident in August.

She was selected after a year of planning by a pastoral residency steering group including pastors, staff and congregation members. Last spring, Session approved a pastoral residency program that is funded by a bequest from long-time member Cynthia Price.

"We are very excited to welcome Libby as our first pastoral resident," says Senior Pastor Sid Batts. "It is evident she has a



heart for ministry in the Presbyterian Church (USA) and a great desire to learn more about being a pastor and a leader in the church. We expect to offer her a great experience and draw from her talents as well."

At FPC, Libby will participate in worship leadership, preaching, teaching, outreach, and church governance. She will serve in rotations such as Christian education, welcoming new members, congregational care, stewardship, and finance and operations. Libby will be mentored by pastors and staff and participate in evaluation and reflection with mentors, FPC members, staff leaders and a

resident counterpart who will begin in the summer of 2015.

A native Midwesterner, Libby (her last name is pronounced BONE-ee) grew up in a Presbyterian denomination that does not ordain women. She earned a bachelor's degree in history at Wheaton College (Ill.) in 2011 and was offered a full scholarship to study theology at Duke. Eventually, she enrolled as a master of divinity student at Duke Divinity School and embraced the PC (USA) as her church home.

Since 2013, Libby has been a pastoral intern with Rev. Mindy Douglas at Chapel in the Pines Presbyterian in Chapel Hill, a Salem Presbytery congregation, assisting in worship planning and leadership and teaching adult education classes. Also, she had a brief internship with Rev. Cherrie Henry at Efland Presbyterian.

In addition to her studies and pastoral internship, she has supervised a Duke University residence hall of 450 upper class students.

Libby was selected from 14 applicants, including four finalists who interviewed in person in March and April. Applications were received from students at five Presbyterian seminaries: Princeton, Union, Columbia, Louisville and Austin.

"We had an outstanding pool of applicants and four really strong finalists," said Ty Buckner, convener of the steering group. "It was so encouraging to see the talent and enthusiasm among these emerging leaders in the church. The group worked long and hard to select our first resident, and we're very pleased Libby will be joining us."



Helping veterans get behind the wheel and on their feet

Mike Yokely is a military man by training. After boot camp in Georgia, he was stationed at Fort Wainwright, Alaska, and Schofield, Hawaii, where he became an IT network administrator. He had security clearances, the whole shebang. Mike was pleased with his advancement, his level of responsibility. Then he left the service.

"The military does a great job transitioning you into the service," Mike observed wryly. "But it doesn't do much when

it comes to transitioning you out. When I left the service last June – how can I put this? – the civilian world wasn't nearly as welcoming as I'd hoped it would be. I had

the military training and experience but because I didn't have a degree from a civilian institution no one would hire me."

It is an all too common story. Months dragged by while Mike, a faithful servant of our nation, looked for work. Bills went unpaid. Mike moved with his wife and three children into his wife's parents' home. They made the best of it.

"That's been the underlying theme in our marriage," he stated matter-of-factly. "We make the best of whatever comes." But what came was the repo man, who took their car.

Meanwhile, Mike had obtained a part time job at UPS, but as anyone with a 16-, 7-, and 3-year old knows, when it comes to expenses, part time doesn't cut it.

"I finally had a job and was making some money, but the repossession ruined my credit. I literally went to every car dealership in the area – new and used – but frankly, I can't buy a pot of water with my credit rating."

Things looked very bad. In January, UPS called to tell him they no longer needed seasonal workers. It was a moment of desperation.

Then came a blessing. An hour later Timco called. A friend

Minutes of the March Session meeting Approved at the April Session meeting

The Work and Worship of the Session Monday, March 24, 2014.

The stated monthly meeting of the Session of First Presbyterian Church was held on Monday, March 24, 2014, in Redhead Hall. Senior Pastor Sid Batts served as moderator.

The meeting began with a responsive reading from Psalm 89:1-2, 5-6, followed by the singing of the hymn, "For the Beauty of the Earth."

Erwin Fuller, Confirmands and Mentors were in attendance as guests.

Sid gave an overview of the role of Session, the Pastors and how these roles factor into everything that goes on in the life of the church for the confirmands.

The Consent Agenda was approved as distributed.

- From the Clerk: Minutes of the February 17, 2014, stated meeting and March 2, 2014, congregational meeting.
- From the Associate Pastor for Discipleship's Office: February attendance and membership reports, Visitor's report, corrected January attendance report.
- 2013 Church Statistical Report.
- Written reports from Congregational Care, Discipleship and Worship Committees.
- Memorial Tribute: John Calhoun Stuart, Jr.
- Welcome Center Idea Form.

Session members identified their prayer partners for the month.

Growing Deeper, Wider and Tech Savvy – What have we seen and experienced:

- Sermons deep
- Lenten FPC texts deep and tech savvy
- New member couple brought new couple to visit wider
- New welcome video tech savvy
- Emphasis of spiritual practices, Bible studies, etc. – deeper

Communications: Kathleen Smith and Bryan Bowers from Bluezoom spoke to Session about the spiritual component in developing a new logo design for FPC, what is a logo and the principles of good logo design. The intent for the new logo is to be inspirational for both our church

and the community. They led Session in an exercise of potential logo designs for the purpose of our identifying which ones were liked and not liked, why or why not. They also stated that we are at the beginning stages of this process and that it would be inclusive and evolutionary.

Welcome Center Task Force: Nancy Abrams reported that we should be in the new Welcome Center by January. Staff and a variety of church members met to brainstorm ideas of what the Welcome Center would look like and how it would/could be used. Session was asked to complete the form included in our Session packet "WHAT DO YOU WANT TO SEE HAPPENING IN OUR WELCOME CENTER?"

Scripture Reading: Rev. Dolly Jacobs read *Matthew 5: 38-47*.

Faith Sharing: Sid gave an overview for confirmands that Session is elected as the governing body of the church and we also worship, sing, cite scripture, pray together and each month an Elder shares their faith journey. Norman Graham then shared his faith journey with Session members.

Stewardship Committee: Neil reported that almost \$1 million has been pledged for the Supplemental Campaign and that pledges ranged from \$30 to \$100,000. Although still short of the stated goal of \$2.6 million goal for the Supplemental Campaign, the congregation has responded generously from the letter sent stating the need.

Project Review Committee and Property Committee: Tim Millisor reported that the Finance Committee and Property Committee have been meeting to assess the necessary steps regarding the masonry issues around the top of the Sanctuary, discovered as a result of the removal of the ceiling panels and abatement. Blum, general contractor, and Baker Roofing have given estimates, \$ and time, on the roofing repair. Sutton-Kennerly, engineers have also been brought in to give their recommendations to address this problem. Tim stated that the Smith

Building renovation would be completed by the estimated date and that we could possibly move in if the city will give FPC a certificate of occupancy.

Communications/IT: Bonnie McAlister reported that 110 families are being interviewed regarding issues surrounding worship and the use of technology and they are halfway completed with this process. She then presented statistical information on:

- Who are we interviewing? By service style, by length of membership, interviewees by generation, commonalities so far, differences so far
- Technology is the new generation gap. Communication preferences and sample verbatims.
- How do we reach across the gaps?
- Closure: "We are learning a lot; we will continue to learn; and we'll report back as we progress."

Spiritual Practice: Rev. Lori Carter led us in a Sabbath moment with a breath prayer.

Prayers of the People: Rev. Dolly Jacobs led Session in prayer for individuals in our community with needs and read the Prayer to the God of Life from Iona Abbey's Worship Book.

Finance Committee: Mike Krick reported that the Funds Management Team (which includes Tommy Mayes, Chair, Rhonda Youngdahl, Ginni Lineberry & Mike Krick) has met regularly during the year to review the investment and management of the church's **Endowment, Session Designated and** Restricted Funds. He then introduced Tommy Mayes who reported to Session on the 2013 earnings realized on the funds, how the funds are invested and the amount of funds contributed in 2013 to the annual operations of the church. Mike reported on the pre audit 2013 Actual and Budgeted Operating Revenues and Expenses. 2013 Actual Operating Expenses exceeded 2013 Actual Operating Revenues by \$285,690. This variance resulted from

CURRIE LIBRARY ARCHIVAL PROJECT

It's finished! The Currie Library Archival **Project Audiotapes Conversion to Digital** Format (1972-2007) has been completed. Some years ago Currie Library recognized the need to convert its sermon audiotapes to a newer technology. Jennifer Gaddy, FPC's Director of Information Technology, recommended that the 1972-2007 sermon tapes be converted to a digital form. At this time the converted sermons would be able to be accessed from a library computer by date, minister, sermon title, scripture and keyword. Jennifer offered to do this conversion at home where she had the proper equipment.

The Young Men's Bible Class graciously agreed to help pay for the project.

Sermons for the years 1972-2007 were all on audiotape. Reel to reel was the technology before audiotapes. Starting in 2007 sermons were saved digitally. Many YMBC members were FPC members during the time period so this project is especially appealing to them. The Library Ministry Team is very grateful for their support. recording at year-end an estimated write-off for uncollectible pledge revenue and unrealized non-pledge revenue budgeted for 2013. 2013 expenses exceeded amounts budgeted due mainly to overtime incurred by non-salaried staff. The Finance Committee is working with both the Property Committee and Human Resource Committee to address the 2013 operating deficit and the projected 2014 deficit. The joint committees will work together to formulate recommendations to Session that will align with accomplishing the mission of the church. Following this report, Executive Pastor Neil Dunnavant asked for a consensus from Session to bring on people with expertise in "right-sizing" this campus.

New Business:

 Jill Tourtellot reminded Session that the Human Race is being held this Saturday and some of the funds collected will benefit StepUp Ministry.

- Betsy Harrington informed Session that the Bread for the World Conference will be held at Christ UMC on Saturday, April 5th.

and member of the Marine Corps League, a group of former Marines whose purpose is to help veterans, had recommended him for a position as an aircraft mechanic. It was entry level, but the company wanted him. He had a job!

"And it's a job that I actually like," Mike enthused as he related his story.

On January 24, he went to work full time. Then came a second piece of good news. Mike's father-in-law, also a member of the Marine Corps League, attended a meeting where he heard about Wheels4Hope. This organization refurbishes used cars and sells them to deserving individuals at a minimal price plus the cost of a year's insurance.

The Marine Corps League had signed on as a sponsor of the Memorial Day Bike Ride supporting Wheels4Hope. Armed with this information, Mike's father-in-law submitted an application for a car in Mike's name.

Mike is one of four veterans who will receive cars on May 26 before the bike ride. You can meet them during a car blessing ceremony prior to the 8:30 kick-off at Westminster Presbyterian Church on Lake Brandt Road.

Without doubt, Mike is deeply grateful to both organizations. "The Marine Corps League has been a real shot in the arm for me. There aren't very many people who are willing to go out on a limb to help someone. There's never gonna be words in the English language to express how much they've helped me."
