
THE WORD READ: Luke 10:25-37

An expert in the law stood up to test Jesus. "Teacher," he said, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?" He said to him, "What is written in the law? What do you read there?" He answered, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind and your neighbor as yourself." And he said to him, "You have given the right answer; do this, and you will live."

But wanting to vindicate himself, he asked Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?" Jesus replied, "A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho and fell into the hands of robbers, who stripped him, beat him, and took off, leaving him half dead. Now by chance a priest was going down that road, and when he saw him he passed by on the other side. So likewise a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. But a Samaritan while traveling came upon him, and when he saw him he was moved with compassion. He went to him and bandaged his wounds, treating them with oil and wine. Then he put him on his own animal, brought him to an inn, and took care of him. The next day he took out two denarii, gave them to the innkeeper, and said, 'Take care of him, and when I come back I will repay you whatever more you spend.' 

About C. Kavin Rowe



C. Kavin Rowe is the vice dean of the faculty and the George Washington Ivey Distinguished Professor of New Testament. The third volume of his collected essays has recently been published as *Studies in Luke, Acts, and Paul* (Eerdmans, 2024). The second volume, *Method, Context, and Meaning in New Testament Studies,* was published early this year (Eerdmans, 2024), and the first volume, *Leading Christian Communities,* in 2023 (Eerdmans). Rowe is the author of four other books: *Christianity's Surprise: A Sure and Certain Hope* (Abingdon, 2020), *One True Life: the Stoics and Early Christians as Rival Traditions* (Yale University Press, 2016), World Upside Down: Reading Acts in the Graeco-Roman

Age (Oxford University Press, 2009, paperback 2010), and *Early Narrative Christology* (de Gruyter, 2006, repr. Baker Academic, 2009). He has published dozens of articles and essays, and co-edited *The Word Leaps the Gap* (Eerdmans, 2008) and *Rethinking the Unity and Reception of Luke and Acts* (University of South Carolina Press, 2010). He is on the editorial board of several international peer-review journals and has also frequently written articles for *faithandleadership.com*.

Rowe has been a Fulbright Scholar, Regional Scholar for the Society of Biblical Literature, chair of the Society's Southeastern Region New Testament section, president of the Society's Southeastern Region, and was elected to the Studiorum Novi Testamenti Societas. He was awarded a Lilly Faculty Fellowship, a Christian Faith and Life Grant from the Louisville Institute, the John Templeton Prize for Theological Promise, the Paul J. Achtemeier Award, and a Distinguished Scholars grant from the McDonald Agape Foundation.

In 1991, the Session of First Presbyterian Church established the Joe and Betty Mullin Preaching and Teaching Forum to honor the former FPC minister and his wife. IN MEMORIAM

John Alexander Edwards Dec. 2, 1934 - Oct. 2, 2024

During his time as a volunteer manager in Disaster Mental Health with the American Red Cross, John Edwards would encourage staff to be "a meaningful presence" – a commitment he made in his own life for 89 years until his death last fall at River Landing at Sandy Ridge.

A native of Rocky Mount, N.C., John attended Davidson College and met Evelyn Copelan, a student at Queens College (now University), after their freshman year in college. They married shortly after graduation in 1957 and were together 66 years until her death in April 2024. They were blessed with four children, eight grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren.

After earning master's and doctoral degrees in clinical psychology at UNC Chapel Hill and the University of Tennessee, respectively, John set up a private practice in Greensboro that he maintained for decades. He was one of the first licensed psychologists in North Carolina.

John was founding and long-time director of the UNCG Counseling and Testing Center, and he taught psychology at UNCG and N.C. A&T State University. He was a trusted advisor on issues with families in more than 70 appearances in 27 years on WFMY's "The Good Morning Show."

John carried his passion and expertise into the wider community as a volunteer leader for many years. With the Red Cross, he worked on 17 disaster operations and led teams providing mental health support to both clients and disaster workers. He offered pro bono psychological services to low income and homeless people through Greensboro's Urban Ministries.

John was involved in school desegregation and racial reconciliation efforts in Greensboro, including a leadership role on a Board of Education advisory committee related to school integration. He was on the board of Family Life Council and consulted with Head Start.

One organization that was particularly important to him was the Irish Children's Summer Program, which brought Protestant and Catholic children from Belfast to Greensboro in an effort to bring those communities together.

John and Evelyn were active at First Presbyterian Church; he as an Elder and long-time senior high youth advisor and she as Director of Christian Education for Elementary Children.

He received the Clara Barton Award for Meritorious Volunteer Leadership from the Red Cross, the Media Award from the N.C. Mental Health Association and Physician of the Year from the Greensboro Mayor's Office Council on Employment of the Handicapped.

The Session gives thanks to God for John's life and offers its deepest condolences to his family and friends. It requests that a copy of this memorial be placed in its minutes and a copy sent to his family.
