Nothing is impossible with God, not even a blizzard in August. For four days many of us went on an Arctic Adventure with Jesus, learning Bible verses, doing crafts, singing and, of course, eating lots of snacks. Vacation Bible School, no matter the theme, is always fun, joyous and a little chaotic. Seeing volunteers of so many ages coming together to show our children God's love never ceases to warm my heart. Personally, it was a gift to get to know better not only the first-graders I got to help shepherd through the halls, but also the youth who wrangled kids with me. Seeing their patience, their wisdom and their kindness reminded me that our church is in good hands. We have many thoughtful leaders not only on the horizon but also showing us the way right now.

One of my favorite moments of the week was when a member of my group said to me: "I know you. You are one of the church pray-ers. I see you up there all the time!" I affirmed that this was in fact so and that I saw him all the time, too. I pointed to where he sat in worship nearly every week and

said, "I see you over there all of the time!" One of the many reasons I participate in VBS is because I want the children who see me "up there" to know me, and I want to know them as we sit together on the Life Center floor, play on the playground and gather around tables together. I want to be able to greet them by name and learn who they are because, like our youth, they aren't just the future of the church, they are its present.

Our Arctic adventure reminded me that while there is certainly much in the world that is painful and sad, we can't lose sight of all that is beautiful and good. In fact, seeing so many energetic kids, so many dedicated adults, so much that is lovely and commendable and pure, reaffirmed for me that we are to do everything in our power to help all God's children flourish.

This program year we are going to explore what it means to aspire to be a community of abiding faith, authentic belonging and abundant joy. I believe VBS offered us a glimpse as to what that kind of community might look like: every generation coming together to live the Bible story, every person sharing their gifts, everyone welcomed, music, food, games, laughter, a few tears, many prayers, and glitter, lots and lots of glitter.

I am grateful to everyone who made our summer so meaningful, and I look forward to another program year of Christ-centered ministry with each and all of you.

They have lived in Greensboro since 2018. "We had been looking to find a church/place of worship to further our faith that is





TO LIVE IN GRACE AND DIGNITY

The Who and What of the Sadye Bowles Fund

WHO WAS SADYE BOWLES?

A member of FPC who left her estate to the church to help adults 55 and older with the expenses of care at home or in an assisted living or skilled nursing facility.

WHAT IS THE SADYE BOWLES FUND?

A Session-designated restricted endowment, it is part of the church's endowment funds. Annual distributions are used to provide care for recipients and to fund the part-time position of the Director of the Sadye Bowles Fund.

A couple in their eighties, living in their home on Social Security and a small pension, is just making ends meet. He has increasing cognitive issues and cannot be left alone for long. The Sadye Bowles Fund can support a certain number of hours of home care.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE TO RECEIVE HELP?

Adults 55 + with demonstrated financial need living within 50 miles of Greensboro can receive assistance from the Fund. Preference is given to FPC members. Applicants are required to complete an application form and provide full financial disclosure, all of which is held in the strictest confidence. Applications are reviewed by the Fund director and a subcommittee of the Sadye Bowles Ministry Team. Decisions on assistance are made by the full committee.

payments or rent in a person's home or assisted living facility, prescription drugs, medical or dental care, and inhome care from a home-care agency. The Sadye Bowles Fund is designed to provide assistance for specific needs as a supplement to the applicant's financial resources. There is an annual limit on the amount of assistance available.

Diabetic and with cardiovascular problems, she is unable to pay for the prescription medicines, even with insurance. The Fund can cover some of the cost of the medicines.

Exploring doubt, faith and time away

The FPC Women's Retreat has a new voice as keynote speaker, and it has an English accent! Niki Hardy is a speaker and author raised and educated in England. Nearly 20

BY TAMARA SLAUGHTER FPC member years ago she and her husband, along with their three young children, moved to NC

to start CityChurch in Charlotte. With her children grown and lots of life experience behind her, she is sharing her messages of faith during times of doubt, and encouragement when life falls apart. She has definitely been through both.

When her kids were young, Niki attended seminary at Wycliffe College (part of Oxford University) in a Biblical and Theological Studies evening program while her husband attended full-time seminary. While she attests that her professors would

be surprised she is an author, and that writing for her is an act of obedience instead of a joyful natural calling, she currently has three published books. The most recent, *God*, *Can We Chat?*, is a "daringly honest guide to growing closer to God, one doubt at a time."

When Niki says "doubt brings our faith to life" she is speaking from hard experiences. Her mother died of cancer; several years later her sister passed from cancer as well. Within six weeks of her sister's death, Niki received a cancer diagnosis herself. She found ways not only to cope but also to grow her faith, concepts she outlines in her books.

During the soul-searching a cancer diagnosis brought, she

Mid-year report from Finance Committee


We want to thank our congregation and friends of our church for your generosity. Your gifts allow the wonderful ministries of our church to do amazing work.

It is important for our members and friends to understand the careful use of our resources. Ministries include our youth programs, music for the traditional service and Rejoice! worship, food programs, and many more. Perhaps most important is the care that our ministers provide when our members experience a life event or personal need. We are so proud of our staff, from our senior minister to our housekeeping staff. We run a very lean budget for salaries and benefits. Not surprisingly, this is our largest expense and our most important.

The Finance Committee works to craft a budget that covers all costs to operate our church. We look to see how our 2025 income and expenses relate to our budget and how they compare to the prior year. We arrived at a deficit budget for 2025 hoping, of course, for an increase in revenue to reduce the deficit.

Here is where we stand as of June 30, the midpoint of the year:

- Total revenue was \$2,528,013. That is \$4,121 below our budgeted amount and \$37,554 better than we were last year at this point.
- Because expenses were slightly lower than



expected, we are \$13,380 above budget for income over expenses.

• Pledge income and non-pledge gifts are slightly below last year.

We continue to hope for a strong second half of the year. Please continue to share your generosity so that our wonderful work can continue.

Finally, I want to thank Finance Director Christine Ciaccio and her team for their excellent work assisting our committee.

found her thoughts were less about the cancer itself and more about how to live to the fullest. She met "thrivers" – people living their best possible life despite late-stage cancer. With this potent concept, she sought to deepen her relationship with God, having confidence that "God is good even when life isn't."

Next, she reflected on her experiences with job shifts, international moves, starting a church, experiencing burnout, and leading a church through the pandemic. The hard concepts of doubt and wavering belief that came with these are daily life for many people. For them (i.e., everyone), she's written How to Trust God When You Can't Stop Worrying, which offers direction in becoming "the calm, confident person you were created to be."

The introduction to her latest book offers this: "If you've found yourself at the crossroads of doubt and faith, disappointed, disillusioned, distant from God, and worried your faith is slipping away, welcome." Niki asks us to read God, Can We Chat? not like we would a novel, but to approach it as an activity with pauses for reflection. Her goal is to guide us as we reimagine doubt, framing it less as a negative and more as a way to wonder. She calls for interaction, some solo with teamwork an option, and it's meant to be fun like a stroll with a friend. This is where the FPC Women's Retreat will focus, in community with and support of each other, with time to contemplate, discuss, and imagine.

How did she get to this place where she could offer help to others? She remembers being called a faith leader early in her journey. She asked the person what they meant and got this reply: "I know you are a leader because people follow you." Niki notes that a leader can be a "guru" in a particular area because they have lived an experience, or they can be a fellow traveler, living through it with you. Whenever possible, Niki tries to affirm that leadership ability in others, recommending a balance in vulnerability, grace, passion, and risk-taking.

She will share these ideas with us in January. "Women's retreats are so vital to the heartbeat, connection, and spiritual life of the church," she says. She sees much of a church's behind-the-scenes fueled by women, and a retreat is a good way to signal that women are valued. She feels these gatherings deepen and renew friendships and cross-pollinate areas of the church as well as ages and backgrounds within the church.

In addition, she muses that retreats are a good way to reconnect with God, to move from talking about God to meeting God, from doing life with God rather than for God. We can voice concerns and ask questions we can't elsewhere. There is an atmosphere of vulnerability and safety, a kind of connection that can't happen at any other time.
