

Generosity is a gift of the Spirit

I remember distinctly a time I felt called to make a financial gift in faith. The notice came via email as I recall, in the early days of GoFundMe. A young woman, a high school classmate of my son, had gotten into some legal trouble, nothing major, an offense that could be considered in line with normal, adolescent experimentation. However, given her circumstances the fallout threatened to ripple and upend her future. She couldn't cover the required fines and a court mandated class. She needed \$800 if she was going to move forward with her hoped-for post-graduation plans.

I'd never met this person, and my son knew her only in passing, but her story struck me because I knew of her peers who'd been caught doing similar things. The outcome wasn't nearly so potentially catastrophic for them because they came from families who had personal connections and the means to afford attorneys. I could feel her fear and desperation as she threw out a plea to anyone listening on the internet.

I read her words several times. I saw a singular donation of \$25 had been made. I thought I'd make a small gift, but when I went to put in the amount, I felt compelled to pay the rest of what she needed to get a fresh start. While it wasn't exactly a sacrificial gift, it was enough at the time to make me shift some other obligations around. Nonetheless, I didn't give it another thought. It just felt right, like the Spirit said, "Do this." And I did. I wanted her to know that she'd been heard and that she was worthy of a second chance. I hoped the gift would help her feel that she wasn't alone and that people cared.

Not long afterward, I got a response, "I don't know you, but I can't thank you enough." I tell this story not as some humble brag or righteousness signaling or to pat myself on the back, but because of the motivation I had and the feeling that making the gift evoked. I was simply moved to share without calculating the outcome or cost. I didn't worry about the recipient's response. I just knew God was calling me to share.

Have you ever felt like that?

That brief, long-ago experience stayed with me through the years and prompted me to pay attention to the nudge that says, "Be generous with whatever you have." Now let's be clear, I don't always have the ears to hear, but every time I listen and follow through, I receive another fruit of the Spirit: the gift of joy. I've discovered, too, that the fruits of the Spirit grow exponentially whenever they are shared, be it kindness, goodness or self-control. Never once have I made an offering in faith that God didn't bless and grow.

I am grateful for the generosity of so many of you who've shared your gifts of time, talent, and treasure not only for the ministries of this church, but also for the sake of the world God loves. I am inspired, daily, by the countless ways I see you heeding the Spirit, and the lives your faithfulness impacts for good. I can't thank you enough.



PARTNER SPOTLIGHT



The Interfaith Housing Initiative (IHI) started in 2023 as a group of faith communities coming together to explore what we could do to address Greensboro's housing crisis. In the past two years, it has grown into a network of 45 faith communities and organizations, and received its 501(c)3 non-profit status this past March. IHI has collaborated with and made donations to Guilford County Schools Homeless Support Services, The Pathways Center, YWCA, and Greensboro Urban Ministries Winter Emergency Shelter program.

Putting its faith and mission into practice, IHI's first project with building is a six-apartment unit with Partnership Homes to provide safe and affordable housing for low-income families. This building will be added to the existing buildings Partnership Homes owns and operates at the corner of West Terrell Street and Short Street in southeast Greensboro. These are our neighbors – literally. Our church is in the poorest ZIP Code in Guilford County, 27401.



Get ready to welcome Rev. Dr. Erin Bowers



There is a lot to be learned from Jonah's story about God's willingness and ability to work through us, despite our bad attitudes and worst intentions.

Erin will join FPC in November as associate pastor for Christian Formation.

Tell us a bit about you.

I grew up in Raleigh and most of my family is still there — my parents and my brother and his family. I went to Duke University for undergrad, then worked for a few years before I enrolled at Princeton Theological Seminary. That is where I met my husband, Jay, who is a United Methodist pastor in Davidson County. (Because he serves a church as well, you may not see him frequently — but he is real!) After meeting Jay, and then completing my M.Div., I stayed at Princeton to begin my Ph.D. By the time I finished in 2011, I had also gotten married (in Scotland!), moved back to North Carolina, had our first child, and been called to First Presbyterian Church of High Point. We've been in our home since June of 2005, and for now we plan to stay there — it works well because it is located between our two churches, and my youngest (Helen) can stay at her middle school. Our oldest (Martha Glenn) just left for Coastal Carolina University in Conway, SC, pursuing a BFA in Musical Theatre.

You have a Ph.D. in systematic theology. What exactly is that and why is it important?

Systematic theology is the in-depth study of Christian thought, focused on organizing, interpreting, and articulating Christian beliefs in a coherent way. Systematic theology asks questions like: Who is God? Who is Jesus? How do we understand salvation? As I understand theology as a discipline, it is always a discipline that is for the church — not just a discipline for theologians to mull over in academia. This doesn't mean everyone needs to have a Ph.D. in theology, though! But theologians have a particular calling to help the church be the church. Theology shapes teaching and preaching. It helps ground the church in its

own tradition — in our case, in the Reformed tradition — while also being able to engage with contemporary issues and figure out how Christian faith speaks to the present moment. It deepens our understanding of faith and guides the witness of the church to speak faithfully in the world.

This fall our children are studying favorite Bible stories. What is your favorite Bible story and why?

I love the parables of Jesus, and so many stories from the Gospels — especially the Gospel of Luke — that is my favorite Gospel. And I always kind of forget about Acts, but then, whenever I spend any time reading or studying it, I am reminded about how compelling some of those stories are. But probably my very favorite story in the Bible is the story of Jonah. It is appealing to children (who doesn't love a story about being swallowed by a giant fish and then vomited out again!) and I think that there is a lot to be learned from Jonah's story about God's willingness and ability to work through us,

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despite our bad attitudes and worst intentions.

What is the first thing you will move to or hang up in your office at FPC?

Books. I have so many books! A lot of people say you need to own 1,000 books for a collection to be considered a library. I definitely have more than 1,000. I will probably have to find some creative storage solutions in my office for all these books. I have been trying to cull as I pack and unpack, but it isn't easy — I always think, "I might just need that book someday..."

What are a few of your favorite things?

Some things I love: musicals (everything from Broadway to elementary school productions — I'll go see anything); Tervis tumblers (it's like a cup that comes with its own coaster!); a Cobb salad; jigsaw puzzles; reading (physical books, Kindle, audiobooks inclusive); a Disney vacation; a crisp fall day; New Yorker cartoons; knitting things that are either squares or rectangles (if you knit, you'll understand my skill level); strong black coffee.

What is one thing about you that would surprise those who know you best?

I run an anonymous Instagram page. I don't want to say too much, because I don't want any of my 42 followers to find out I'm the person behind it. But suffice it to say ... it is mostly about litter. My daughters describe my weird hobby as "taking pictures of trash."

Renovation update

Although scaffolding has begun going up on the Greene Street side of the sanctuary, its completion has been delayed. The upper anchoring is being reengineered and tested for safety. Other work is going on, however. Mortar mixes are being prepared and tested, and bricks are being reviewed to make sure they match. As tests before the full project begins, several 10×10 sections of brick will be tuckpointed and reviewed. As soon as we have the updated schedule we will let you know.
